

Georgette E. Dumont, MPA, Ph.D.

Dr. Georgette Dumont is currently an Associate Professor at the University of North Florida, in the Department of Political Science and Public Administration. She was hired in 2010 to teach in the Nonprofit Management concentration for the Masters of Public Administration program.

Dr. Dumont brings to her classes both her academic research and experiences from working in both the nonprofit and public sectors. Prior to entering higher education, she worked for a diverse set of nonprofits in Southeastern Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and Illinois, from the United Way of Southeastern New England to the American Farmland Trust, as well as working for a public high school. She couples the knowledge gained through experience with her research on the nonprofit sector to engage and inform her students and the public about the role and importance of the nonprofit sector.

Dr. Dumont has presented nationally on her research, which centers on nonprofit and government accountability via new technologies, and she is currently contracted to write a book on nonprofit accountability with Oxford University Press. She has also conducted research on how new technologies intersect with accountability, and has published in journals such as *Nonprofit and Voluntary Sector Quarterly*, *Journal of Nonprofit Education and Leadership*, and the *American Review of Public Administration*.

Dr. Dumont has also been a consultant to nonprofits and government on leadership, accountability, governance, and the usage of information communication technologies to help meet the organization's mission. She currently conducts workshops for nonprofits about sustainability and using technologies for fundraising, governance, and communication.

In addition to her teaching, research and consulting, Dr. Dumont also serves on Jacksonville Beach, Florida's City Council.

Dr. Dumont remains active in government and administration by serving on boards, committees, and task forces at both the local and national levels.
